


Cement City

(1925)


- Small town in West Dallas created to support workers in the cement plants in the area
- Largely Mexican-American workforce
- Company towns: Cemento Chico and Cemento Grande



RSR Lead Smelter

(1934)


- Operated in West Dallas for over 50 years, processing spent car batteries and scrap lead
- Waste and byproducts sent to nearby landfills
- With organizing from West Dallas Coalition for EJ, designated EPA superfund site in 1995



Flooding in S. Dallas

(1935)


- Levee protection ended exactly at the railroad trestle the Forest Avenue bridge is mostly underwater
- The river above the trestle: a beautiful feat of engineering; below: water, water everywhere



Dixie Metals Lead Smelter

(1954)

- Operated in Cadillac Heights until the 1990s
- Slag and casing debris from the batteries dumped in landfills nearby, mixed with soil for ground cover use, and used as pavement for driveways.




Deepwood Dump

(1980s-90s)

- Illegal dump in Shady Grove that resulted from V.V.

 Construction Co. mining sand/gravel and filling the pits
 with solid waste; 82 acre lot with over 2 million cy trash
- Now is the Trinity River Audubon Center




Lane Plating Works (1920s - 2018)

- Operated over 90 years in Highland Hills, electroplating chromium and cadmium
- Contaminated on-site soils and shallow groundwater
- Designated as a Federal Superfund Site in 2018
- Lane Plating Citizens Advisory Group




Shingle Mountain (2018)


- Illegal landfill in Floral Farms resulting from Blue Star Recycling dumping 70,000 tons of roofing shingles
- Shingles removed in late 2020; 40,000 cy of contaminated soil removed in 2023
- Southern Sector Rising

Asphalt Shingle Factories (1940s-now)





GAF + TAMKO emit:

- 63% of Dallas' industrial sulfur dioxide
- 21% of Dallas' industrial PM2.5
- 10% of Dallas' industrial hydrocarbons

Joppa and the Singleton
Corridor represent only
0.15% of Dallas residents,
almost all of whom are Black
and Brown.



Over 10% of Dallas' industrial pollution is dumped in these two neighborhoods.
